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INTRODUCTION

The Security Council is the organ of the United Nations which has primary responsibility for the maintenance of international peace and security under the Charter of the United Nations. The Council, which is composed of 15 members, is organized so as to be able to function continuously.

The *Index to Proceedings of the Security Council* is a guide to the documentation and proceedings of the Security Council, its commissions, committees and *ad hoc* committees. The present issue covers the sixtieth year (2005) of the Security Council and its 7 sub-bodies which met during the year. The Index is prepared by the Dag Hammarskjöld Library, Department of Public Information, as one of the products of the United Nations Bibliographic Information System (UNBIS).

ARRANGEMENT OF THE INDEX

The Index consists of the following parts:

Sessional information, listing members and officers, and providing information on rules of procedure and on resolutions and decisions;

Check-list of meetings, listing the meetings of the Council and those of its subsidiary bodies that met during the year;

Agenda, listing matters considered by and brought before the Council together with the subject headings under which these items are listed in the Subject index;

Subject index, providing topical access to Security Council documentation arranged alphabetically by subjects and listing documents submitted to the Council, the meetings at which items were considered and the action taken, if any;

Index to speeches, providing access to speeches that were made before the Security Council. The index is subdivided into 3 sections: corporate names/countries, speakers and subjects;

List of documents, listing documents arranged by symbol;

Resolutions adopted by the Security Council, 2005, listing resolution numbers, the subjects under which they may be found in the Subject index, as well as meetings and dates on which the resolutions were adopted;

Voting chart, indicating the voting for resolutions adopted by the Council.

DOCUMENTATION OF THE SECURITY COUNCIL

Documents of the Security Council are first issued in provisional form. A selected number of them are subsequently printed in the quarterly *Supplements to Official Records*, where they are arranged chronologically. Some special reports are issued individually as numbered *Special Supplements*. Resolutions adopted by the Security Council, first issued in provisional form, are later collected along with decisions taken, in a separate volume of the *Official Records* of the year. After their republication in the *Official Records*, the provisional documents are no longer available.

Double-symbol documents bearing both S/- and A/- symbols were submitted to both the Security Council and the General Assembly.

Verbatim records of meetings of the Security Council appear first in provisional form. They may be identified by their symbol, which consists of the series corresponding to that of the meeting, e.g., S/PV.5300. Verbatim records of meetings are later printed as separate fascicles in the *Official Records*.

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AGENDA

The Council's practice is to adopt at each meeting, on the basis of a provisional agenda circulated in advance, the agenda for that meeting. At subsequent meetings an item may appear in its original form or with the addition of such sub-items as the Council may decide to include. Once included in the agenda, an item remains on the list of matters of which the Council is seized, until the Council agrees to its removal.

The agenda as adopted for each meeting in 2005 will be found in the *Official Records of the Security Council, Sixtieth Year* (S/PV.5108-5342). A list of weekly summary statements of matters of which the Security Council is seized, and on the stage reached in their consideration, submitted by the Secretary-General under rule 11 of the provisional rules of procedure of the Security Council, appears in the Subject index under the heading "UN. (Adopted unanimously, 5117th meeting, 28 Jan. 2005)

S/RES/1595(2005) [Establishment of an international independent commission to assist in investigation of the terrorist bombing in Lebanon].

Decides to establish an international independent investigation Commission based in Lebanon to assist the Lebanese authorities in their investigation of all aspects of this terrorist act, including to help identify its perpetrators, sponsors, organizers and accomplices; calls upon the Lebanese government to ensure that the findings and conclusions of the Commission's investigation are taken into account fully; decides that the Commission shall: a) enjoy the full cooperation of the Lebanese authorities; b) have the authority to collect any additional information and evidence; c) enjoy freedom of movement throughout the Lebanese territory; d) be provided with the facilities and staff necessary to perform its functions; requests the Secretary-General to consult urgently with the Lebanese Government with a view to facilitate the establishment and operation of the commission and requests also that he report to the Council accordingly and notify it of the date the Commission begins its full operations; requests also the Secretary-General to undertake without delay the steps, measures and arrangements necessary for the speedy establishment and full functioning of the Commission; directs the Commission to determine procedures for carrying out its investigation; requests the Commission to complete its work within 3 months, and authorizes the Secretary-General to extend the Commission's operation for a further period not exceeding 3 months, and requests that he inform the Security Council accordingly; requests the Commission to report to the Council on the conclusions of its investigation and requests the Secretary-General to update orally the Security Council on the progress of the Commission every 2 months during the operations of the Commission or more frequently as needed. (Adopted unanimously, 5160th meeting, 7 Apr. 2005)

S/RES/1605(2005) [The extension of the UN Disengagement Observer Force (UNDOF)].

Welcomes the efforts being undertaken by UNDOF to implement the Secretary-General's zero tolerance policy on sexual exploitation and abuse and to ensure full compliance of its personnel with the UN code of conduct; decides to renew the mandate of UNDOF for a period of 6 months until 31 Dec. 2005; requests the Secretary-General to submit, at the end of this period, a report on developments in the situation and the measures taken to implement resolution 338 (1973). (Adopted unanimously, 5205th meeting, 17 June 2005)

MIDDLE EAST SITUATION (continued)

S/RES/1614(2005) [Extension of the mandate of the UN Interim Force in Lebanon (UNIFIL)].

Endorses the report of the Secretary-General on UNIFIL of 21 July 2005 (S/2005/460); decides to extend the present mandate until 31 Jan. 2006; condemns all acts of violence, including the recent incidents across the Blue Line that have resulted in deaths and injuries on both sides; supports the continued efforts of UNIFIL to maintain the ceasefire along the withdrawal line through mobile land and air patrols and observation from fixed positions and through close contacts with the parties to correct violations, resolve incidents and prevent their escalation, while stressing the primary responsibility of the parties in this regard. (Adopted unanimously, 5241st meeting, 29 July 2005)

S/RES/1636(2005) [The investigation of terrorist bombings in Lebanon].

Takes note with extreme concern of the Commission's conclusion that, there is converging evidence pointing at the involvement of both Lebanese and Syrian officials in this terrorist act; decides to establish, a Committee of the Security Council consisting of all the members of the Council to undertake the tasks described in the annex to this resolution; welcomes the decision of the Secretary-General to extend the mandate of the Commission until 15 Dec. 2005, as authorized by the Security Council in its resolution 1595 (2005), and decides that it will extend the mandate further if recommended by the Commission and requested by the Lebanese Government; decides that: (a) Syria must detain those Syrian officials or individuals whom the Commission considers as suspected of involvement in the planning, sponsoring, organizing or perpetrating of this terrorist act, and make them fully available to the Commission; (b) the Commission shall have vis-à-vis Syria the same rights and authorities as mentioned in paragraph 3 of resolution 1595 (2005), and Syria must cooperate with the Commission fully and unconditionally on that basis; (c) the Commission shall have the authority to determine the location and modalities for interview of Syrian officials and individuals it deems relevant to the inquiry; insists that Syria not interfere in Lebanese domestic affairs, either directly or indirectly, refrain from any attempt aimed at destabilizing Lebanon, and respect scrupulously the sovereignty, territorial integrity, unity and political independence of this country. (Adopted unanimously, 5297th meeting, 31 Oct. 2005)

MIDDLE EAST SITUATION (continued)

S/RES/1644(2005) [Extension of the mandate of the UN International Independent Investigation Commission in Lebanon].

(Adopted unanimously, 5329th meeting, 15 Dec. 2005)

S/RES/1648(2005) [Renewal of the mandate of the UN Disengagement Observer Force (UNDOF)].

Calls upon the parties concerned to implement immediately its resolution 338 (1973) of 22 Oct. 1973; decides to renew the mandate of the UN Disengagement Observer Force for a period of 6 months, that is, until 30 June 2006; requests the Secretary-General to submit, at the end of this period, a report on developments in the situation and the measures taken to implement resolution 338 (1973). Decides to extend the mandate of UNAMIS, established by its resolution 1547 (2004), until 17 Mar. 2005. (Adopted unanimously, 5137th meeting, 10 Mar. 2005)

S/RES/1588(2005) [Extension of the mandate of the UN Advance Mission in Sudan (UNAMIS)].

Decides to extend the mandate of UNAMIS, established by its resolution 1547 (2004), until 24 Mar. 2005; decides to remain actively seized of the matter. (Adopted unanimously, 5143rd meeting, 17 Mar. 2005)

S/RES/1590(2005) [Establishment of the UN Mission in Sudan (UNMIS)].

Decides to establish UNMIS for an initial period of 6 months and further decides that UNMIS will consist of 10,000 military personnel and 715 civilian personnel; requests the Secretary-General to report to the Council within 30 days on options for how UNMIS can reinforce the effort to foster peace in Darfur; requests that the Secretary-General transfer all functions performed by the UN Advance Mission in Sudan to UNMIS and to keep the Council regularly informed of the progress in implementing the Comprehensive Peace Agreement, respect for the ceasefire, and the implementation of the mandate of UNMIS; requests that the Secretary-General continue to report on a monthly basis on the situation in Darfur; requests the Secretary-General to take the necessary measures to achieve actual compliance in UNMIS with the UN zero-tolerance policy on sexual exploitation and abuse; decides that UNMIS is authorized to take the necessary action, in the areas of deployment of its forces and as it deems within its capabilities, to protect UN personnel, facilities, installations, and equipment; requests that the Secretary-General and the Government of Sudan, following appropriate consultation with the Sudan People's Liberation Movement, conclude a status-of-forces agreement within 30 days of adoption of the resolution; decides to remain seized of the matter. (Adopted unanimously, 5151st meeting, 24 Mar. 2005)

SUDAN–POLITICAL CONDITIONS (continued)

S/RES/1591(2005) [Establishment of a Security Council Committee to monitor implementation of the measures in Darfur].

Decides, in light of the failure of all parties to the conflict in Darfur to fulfil their commitments, (a) to establish a Committee of the Security Council consisting of all the members of the Council to monitor implementation of the measures referred to in subparagraphs (d) and (e) of this paragraph and paragraphs 7 and 8 of resolution 1556 (2004); (b) to request the Secretary-General to appoint for a period of 6 months, within 30 days of adoption of this resolution, a Panel of Experts comprised of 4 members and based in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, to travel regularly to E-Fasher, Sudan and other locations in Sudan, and to operate under the direction of the Committee; (c) that those individuals who impede the peace process, constitute a threat to stability in Darfur and the region, commit violations of international humanitarian or human rights law or other atrocities, violate the measures implemented by Member States in accordance with paragraphs 7 and 8 of resolution 1556 (2004) and paragraph 7 of this resolution as implemented by a state, or are responsible for offensive military overflights described in paragraph 6 of this resolution, shall be subject to the measures identified in subparagraphs (d) and (e) below; (d) that all States shall take the necessary measures to prevent entry into or transit through their territories of all persons as designated by the Committee; (e) that all States shall freeze all funds, financial assets and economic resources that are on their territories on the date of adoption of this resolution or at any time thereafter, that are owned or controlled, directly or indirectly, by the persons designated by the Committee pursuant to subparagraph (c) above; decides that the measures referred to in subparagraphs 3(d) and (e) shall enter into force 30 days from the date of adoption of this resolution, unless the Security Council determines before then that the parties to the conflict in Darfur have complied with all the commitments and demands referred to in paragraph 1 above and paragraph 6 below. (Adopted 12-0-3, 5153rd meeting, 29 Mar. 2005)

SUDAN–POLITICAL CONDITIONS (continued)

S/RES/1593(2005) [Referring the situation in Darfur since 1 July 2002 to the Prosecutor of the International Criminal Court].

Decides to refer the situation in Darfur since 1 July 2002 to the Prosecutor of the International Criminal Court; decides that the Government of Sudan and all parties to the conflict in Darfur, shall cooperate with the Court and the Prosecutor pursuant to this resolution; invites the Court and the African Union to discuss practical arrangements that will facilitate the work of the Prosecutor; also encourages the Court to support international cooperation with domestic efforts to promote the rule of law, protect human rights and combat impunity in Darfur; decides that nationals, current or former officials or personnel from a contributing State outside Sudan which is not a party to the Rome Statute of the International Criminal Court shall be subject to the exclusive jurisdiction of that contributing State for all alleged acts or omissions arising out of or related to operations in Sudan established or authorized by the Council or the African Union, unless such exclusive jurisdiction has been expressly waived by that contributing State; recognizes that none of the expenses incurred in connection with the referral shall be borne by the UN and that such costs shall be borne by the parties to the Rome Statute and those States that wish to contribute voluntarily. (Adopted 11-0-4, 5158th meeting, 31 Mar. 2005)

S/RES/1627(2005) [Extension of the mandate of the UN Mission in Sudan (UNMIS)].

Decides to extend the mandate of UNMIS until 24 Mar. 2006, with the intention to renew it for further periods; requests the Secretary-General to report to the Council every 3 months on the implementation of the mandate of UNMIS, including its work to reinforce the efforts of the African Union Mission in the Sudan to foster peace in Darfur; urges troop-contributing countries to take appropriate action to prevent sexual exploitation and abuse by their personnel in UNMIS, including pre-deployment awareness training, and to take disciplinary action and other action to ensure full accountability in cases of such misconduct involving their personnel. (Adopted unanimously, 5269th meeting, 23 Sept. 2005)

S/RES/1651(2005) [Extension of the mandate of the UN Panel of Experts Established pursuant to Security Council Resolution 1591 (2005) to monitor implementation of the measures in Darfur].

Decides to extend the mandate of the Panel of Experts appointed pursuant to resolution 1591 (2005) until 29 Mar. 2006, and requests the Secretary-General to take the necessary administrative measures; requests the Panel of Experts to report and make recommendations to the Council, through the Committee established by paragraph 3 (a) of resolution 1591 (2005), prior to the termination of its mandate, on the implementation of the measures imposed by paragraphs 3, 6 and 7 of resolution 1591 (2005) and paragraphs 7 and 8 of resolution 1556 (2004). (Adopted unanimously, 5342nd meeting, 21 Dec. 2005)

Refers to previous 210 letters from Palestine dated 29 Sept. 2000-29 Dec. 2004 and concerns alleged Israeli military campaign against Palestinians; reports alleged killing of at least 7 civilians, majority of whom were children under 18, and wounding of 8 others in the town of Beit Lahiya in the Gaza Strip, 4 Jan. 2005, as well as another attack in the area of Khan Younis just 5 days ago, resulted in 9 deaths; reports also alleged restrictions imposed on the freedom of movement of Palestinians and humanitarian personnel and candidates campaigning for the presidential election; includes the names of the 22 Palestinians killed, 19 Dec. 2004-4 Jan. 2005.

S/2005/38 (A/ES-10/295) Identical letters, 18 Jan. 2005, from Palestine addressed to the Secretary-General and the President of the Security Council. Refers to previous 211 letters from Palestine dated 29 Sept. 2000-4 Jan. 2005 and reports alleged continued military raids and attacks by Israeli forces against civilian areas in the Gaza Strip, and continued collective punishments of Palestinians, including closures and other restrictions on movement and imprisonment of civilians requiring medical treatment; reports also that closure of the Karni crossing, through which all food and other goods enter Gaza, has led to a decrease in food supply and other necessities; includes the names of 34 Palestinians killed, 5-17 Jan. 2005.

Refers to letter from Israel (A/59/667-S/2005/14) and refutes accusations against the Syrian Arab Republic regarding the current situation in territories occupied by Israel; concerns the construction of the illegal wall, confiscations of Palestinian lands, Israeli settlement policies, terrorism, adherence to international resolutions and peacebuilding efforts in the Middle East.

S/2005/40 (A/59/678) Letter, 19 Jan. 2005, from Israel. Concerns recent alleged attacks against Israel citizens in the Gaza Strip, on the Israeli side of the Blue Line, involving Hizbullah, and in the town of Sderot, resulted in the deaths of 7 civilians and 1 military person, and injuries to many others, 9-18 Jan. 2005; calls upon the international community to reaffirm its rejection of terrorist tactics.

S/2005/46 (A/ES-10/296) Identical letters, 26 Jan. 2005, from Palestine addressed to the Secretary-General and the President of the Security Council. Refers to previous 212 letters from Palestine dated 29 Sept. 2000-18 Jan. 2005 and concerns continued construction of the Wall, confiscation of land and destruction of Palestinian properties, military raids and attacks by Israeli forces against civilian areas in the Occupied Palestinian Territory; states that since the last letter at least 13 Palestinians have been killed; includes the names of 13 Palestinians killed, 19-26 Jan. 2005.

S/2005/101 (A/ES-10/297) Identical letters, 22 Feb. 2005, from Palestine addressed to the Secretary-General and the President of the Security Council. Reports that the Israel Government allegedly approved the final route of the Wall it has been constructing in the Occupied Palestinian Territory since June 2002 and that the new Wall will result in the de facto annexation of at least 7 percent of the total area of the West Bank; states also that the Wall is severing and isolating cities, towns and villages in the West Bank, creating walled enclaves for thousands of civilians; includes the names of Palestinians killed, 27 Jan.-20 Feb. 2005.

S/2005/130 (A/59/717) Letter, 28 Feb. 2005, from Israel. Reports an attack allegedly committed by a Palestinian suicide bomber in Tel Aviv, resulted in the deaths of 5 people and injuries to more than 50 others, 25 Feb. 2005; calls upon the Palestinian leadership and the international community to reaffirm its rejection of terrorist tactics.

S/2005/143 (A/59/726) Note verbale, 7 Mar. 2005, from the Syrian Arab Republic. Refers to document dated 28 Feb. 2005 from Israel (A/59/717-S/2005/130) and denies allegations on Syria's connection to recent armed incident in Tel-Aviv; states that it constitutes distortion of the facts and levels accusations against the Syrian Arab Republic without facts or evidence.

S/2005/170 (A/59/739) Letter, 11 Mar. 2005, from the Islamic Republic of Iran. Refers to the letters of 11 Jan. and 28 Feb. 2005 from Israel (A/59/667-S/2005/14 and A/59/717-S/2005/130) and rejects the allegations contained therein.

S/2005/237 (A/ES-10/299) Identical letters, 10 Apr. 2005, from Palestine addressed to the Secretary-General and the President of the Security Council. Refers to previous 215 letters from Palestine dated 29 Sept. 2000-23 Mar. 2005 and concerns alleged continued Israeli military campaign against Palestinians; reports armed incident in the Rafah refugee camp in southern Gaza, resulted in the deaths of 3 Palestinian boys and injury to another teenage boy, 9 Apr. 2005; includes the names of 5 Palestinians killed, 8-10 Apr. 2005.

S/2005/244 (A/ES-10/300) Identical letters, 15 Apr. 2005, from Palestine addressed to the Secretary-General and the President of the Security Council. Refers to previous 216 letters from Palestine dated 29 Sept. 2000-10 Apr. 2005 and reports armed incident allegedly involving Israeli forces dressed in civilian clothes, in the Balata refugee camp in Nablus, resulted in a death of a Palestinian, 14 Apr. 2005.

S/2005/262 (A/ES-10/301) Letter, 20 Apr. 2005, from the Chairman of the Committee on the Exercise of the Inalienable Rights of the Palestinian People. Concerns the growing Israel's settlement activities in the Occupied Palestinian Territory, in connection with the recent announcement regarding construction of 50 homes in the West Bank settlement of "Elkana" south of Qalqilya.

S/2005/274 Letter, 18 Apr. 2005, from the League of Arab States. Transmits letter dated 17 Apr. 2005 from the Secretary-General of the League of Arab States regarding the outcome of the 17th session at the summit level of the Council of the League of Arab States, held in Algiers, 22-23 Mar. 2005; includes resolutions nos. 17/287 to 17/324 and the Algiers Declaration, adopted at the 17th session, together with the final Communiqué issued at the session.

S/2005/306 Letter, 6 May 2005, from the Secretary-General. Reports the Secretary-General's intention to appoint Alvaro de Soto as the UN Special Coordinator for the Middle East Peace Process and the Secretary-General's Personal Representative to the Palestine Liberation Organization and the Palestinian Authority, to succeed Terje Roed-Larsen, who served until 31 Dec. 2004.

Refers to previous 217 letters from Palestine dated 29 Sept. 2000-15 Apr. 2005 and concerns recent announcement by Israeli Government to continue construction of the wall in and around Jerusalem; calls on the international community to undertake measures and revive the peace process; states that since the last report 11 more Palestinians were killed; includes the names of 11 Palestinians killed, 10 Apr.-16 May 2005.

S/2005/327 (A/59/805) Identical letters, 19 May 2005, from Israel addressed to the Secretary-General and the President of the Security Council. Reports latest attacks allegedly perpetrated by Hamas against Israeli communities in the Gaza Strip and western Negev, 18 May 2005; calls on the international community to reaffirm its absolute rejection of armed attacks and to make every effort to bring its perpetrators to justice.

S/2005/339 (A/59/810) Identical letters, 23 May 2005, from Lebanon addressed to the Secretary-General and the President of the Security Council. Responds to allegations made by the Permanent Representative of Israel in its letter dated 12 May 2005 regarding violations of the Blue Line in southern Lebanon.
